1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Jagarlamudi Kuppuswamy Choudary College (Autonomous) was established during 1968 in Guntur, Andhra Pradesh with a motto of providing holistic education that builds Character along with Education (Seelena Sobhate Vidya)

The Nagarjuna Education Society was formed in 1967 by eminent educationists and philanthropists with an aim to serve the society in the field of education. The society is named after the great Buddhist Scholar Acharya Nagarjuna. The brain child of the society is Jagarlamudi Kuppuswamy Choudary College. The legacy of the college started with its name given after the Noble Patron, Educationist, Celebrated Philanthropist Sri Jagarlamudi Kuppuswamy Choudary.

Under the aegis of NES Eight educational institutions were started covering areas of Science and Commerce College, Peracherla School, CBSE School, Education, Engineering and Technology, Law, Pharmacy and Nursing. These institutions combine quality concerns, value-oriented courses in diversified areas of knowledge to meet the educational requirements of different sections of society. Jana Sikshana Samsthan was allotted to our Society by HRD Ministry.

The institution is constructed in an area of 6.802 acres, consisting of Nine multi-storied academic blocks, outdoor playgrounds, indoor courts, Gym and other infrastructure facilities. The campus is surrounded by trees and lush green landscaped lawns that provides congenial learning atmosphere. It is well connected with major cities of the state and country by air, rail and At present, the institution offers 18 UG, 06 PG Programmes, under 21 faculties with an enrolment of more than 2379 students. 03 Programmes (B.Voc) are introduced during 2020-21.

The institution is recognized under 2(f) & 12(B) on 30-09-1969 and conferred autonomous status during 2007-2008 by University Grants Commission and is accredited with A Grade (2nd Cycle) by NAAC.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Curriculum is designed to meet demands of industry and society, build competence to meet institution's vision and mission following the guidelines of UGC - National Curriculum Framework and Guidelines, Andhra Pradesh State Council for Higher Education. (APSCHE)

The institution offers UG and PG programmes under the Choice Based Credit System

The CBCS was implemented in 2015-16 for all Programmes

The Syllabus is framed by Board of Studies and approved by Academic Council. Syllabus revision is done for 80% of Programmes. The curriculum is revised as per the needs to meet the Local, National, Regional and Global demands. Outcome Based Education (OBE) is implemented from the academic year 2020-21 onwards. COs and POs for all the programmes are prepared and placed on the Website.

Skill enhancement courses, Generic electives for interdisciplinary learning, lab on project to promote undergraduate research and internships for on the job experience are included in the revised CBCS pattern. Number of New courses introduced is 32% of all the courses offered over 5 years.

The Curriculum also includes courses for societal concerns like Environmental sustainability, Gender equity, Human rights and research aptitude like research methodology and entrepreneurship. About 68% students of the year 2021-22 have done Project work / Internship.

Extension activities are also included in the curriculum and carries credits. Value added courses are offered for curriculum enrichment and skill enhancement.

Additional credits awarded for online courses (SWAYAM, NPTEL, etc.), self-study course, and achievements in co-curricular and extracurricular activities. Feedback on curriculum is obtained from all stakeholders and analyzed for continuous improvement.

The necessary action is initiated basing on feed back from stake holders.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The institution attracts students from Guntur, surrounding districts and other states. Students are admitted as per the reservation policy of the Government of Andhra Pradesh.

• Five new programmes were introduced during the assessment period, leading to a steady increase in the admission of students. The average enrollment percentage is 79.13 during last 5 years. The average percentage of seats filled against reserved categories is 72%.

Well qualified faculty with 20% of them holding Ph.D. degree and they continuously enhance their academic expertise through FDPs and online courses. The average teaching experience of faculty is 16.46 years The average student-teacher ratio is 29:1 to enhance teaching-learning efficiency.

The institution attracts mixed population of students which includes first generation learners from rural background. An Extensive Orientation Programme "**Deeksharambh'**" (Student Induction Programme) is organized to familiarize students with the academic environment.

The learner level identification mechanism (slow and advanced) is adopted and strategies devised for effective learning experience for all categories. The institution follows mentoring system with a Mentor - Mentee ratio of 1:29

Adequate measures are taken to impart essential skills through experiential/participative learning and problem solving methods. ICT tools like Google Classroom and Zoom are effectively used to enhance learning

experience of students.

The Revised CBCS with OBE model introduced in 2020-21 facilitates student-centric learning. OBE model curriculum is followed and attainment is calculated by direct and indirect methods. Academic schedule is prepared meticulously and adherence is ensured. Curriculum plan and delivery is ensured by External Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA).

A customized Examination Management System has been developed for the institution to automate the Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and Semester End Examination (SEE) process. The average number of days between last date of examination and date of declaration of results is 37 daysThe average number of examination related grievances received is 8% which are properly addressed. SSS is conducted annually by the institution to get feedback from students on Teaching, Learning Processes and infrastructural amenities.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The institution aims to create a research culture by providing adequate resources and facilities to realize its mission. Research activities are coordinated by the Research and Consultancy Cell with a well-defined research promotion policy. Research ethics is integrated into the curriculum and the Research Committee gives guidelines and ensures code of ethics in research. 113 Research Articles were published in Scopus / Web of Science/ UGC Care Journals and 55 Research articles are published with ISSN/ISBN number. 63 articles were published in National/ International Conference Proceedings. Currently 20 scholars are pursuing their research (M.Phil./ Ph.D.) under recognized research supervisors.

The students are encouraged to write research papers, submit a dissertation in lieu of a paper, participate in conferences and seminars, take up internships, become entrepreneurs and sell their products at College fests.

80 Programmeswere organized pertaining to Research Methodology, Intellectual Property Rights, Entrepreneurship and Skill Development, Workshop on IPR, Conferences and Seminar. Faculty/ Student Exchange programmes arranged and 19 programmes were conducted to promote collaborative research and publications. Lab on Projects stimulate Undergraduate Research. Faculty received certificates of Excellence in recognition of outstanding contributions to the quality of Journals.

Extension Services carried out in nearby villages carry a weightage of one credit in curriculum and 188 initiatives are driven by the NSS, NCC and YRC.2 credits are assigned to YOGA as a part of curriculum for UG Programmes in revised CBCS.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

To stay on par with nationally renowned educational institutions, our campus stands high with state-of-art infrastructure. It beholds modern infrastructure, powerful and secure information technology support and hitech library. The campus is spread over 6.802 acres with a built-up area of 17,892.93 Sq. Mts.

Out of 55 class rooms 30 classrooms were ICT enabled with Wi-Fi/LAN connectivity. The campus comprises of 4 digitally equipped Seminar Halls for effective functioning.

Our college has seven computer labs, one hard ware lab, one Commerce Lab and two Language labs.Student

Computer ratio is 5:1.

UG & PG Libraries houses 82,836 volumes of books under 64,771 titles, research reports, periodicals and magazines. Digital Library with 18 computers supports online access, 24/7 learning powered with OPAC, INFLIBNET-N-List, for remote access. The library is automated with integrated Library Management Software SOUL 2.0.

Our research lab with advanced equipment cater towards experiential learning and research laboratory promote science education and develop research interest among undergraduate students.

Vast outdoor grounds with 4 acres and indoor space of 4833 Sq. Ft encourage sports and games. A gymnasium 2100 Sq. Ft for both men and women have been designed for faculty and students.

Our college canteen caters to staff, students and visitors with a dining area that serves 72 members at a time. A Union Bank of India branch across the road makes financial transactions easy for both staff and students.

Fire extinguishers are installed on all floors for emergency situations. 60 CCTV camera are positioned at strategic locations to ensure vigilance.

The institution holds MoUs with 17 for industry-institute partnerships.

The infrastructure maintenance is in accordance to the College Maintenance Policy which is regularly monitored by the Building committee of J.K.C. College.

Student Support and Progression

The institution provides a conducive environment which supports holistic development, and career progression. The institution provides scholarships to economically challenged and students with passion for sports. In addition, necessary guidance is provided to secure scholarships from government and philanthropists. About 62% of students are getting scholarships from the Government.

In order to make the student competent, training on soft skills, communicative skills, life skills and technical skills are provided. Career Counseling and training for competitive examinations are extended through exclusive centers. The institution adheres to the guidelines of regulatory bodies with regard to anti-ragging and sexual harassment prevention ensure a safe campus.

Jagarlamudi Kuppuswamy Choudary College believes that education is a potent armament that leads to the progression of students both academically and professionally. The institutions' placement cell systematically trains the students and maintains a good placement record. The average percentage of placement of outgoing students during the last 5 years is 34%. The number of students qualifying in State/National / International level examinations during last five years is 35.

The students accumulate laurels in sports, games and cultural programs. NSS volunteers regularly participate in Republic Day Parade and National Integration Camps. The Students play a pivotal role in effective functioning of Academic, Co-curricular and extracurricular activities It nurtures conservation of peace and harmony among student community. Alumni extends financial support by way of scholarships and for the creation of endowment funds. The College celebrated its Golden jubilee in February 2018. Alumni donated an amount of

Rs.1.4 Crore for the infrastructure development of the College.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The governance of the college is participative and ensures quality and excellence in teaching, research and outreach activities. Statutory and non-statutory committees administer the overall functioning and execution of academic, administrative, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. Budget allocation and fund mobilization are executed by the finance committee with approval of governing body. Policy Decisions are approved by Governing Body, Academic Council, and executed by Heads of Department and Faculty. Decentralization and participative management involving HoDs, Coordinators of centers, cells and committees, faculty and students help for effective administration and smooth functioning of the institution. The Strategic Development and Deployment plan of the institution is deployed to accomplish the goals. E-governance is adopted in administration and Student Admission and Support, Library and Exam Cell. The management extends welfare schemes to faculty and staff. Financial Support extended to attend conference, refresher course and faculty development programmes. Internal Quality Assurance Cell is the primary body of the Institution which promotes quality initiatives related to academics, Research and Development, Administration and Student development. IQAC ensures quality in teaching learning processes through a structured feedback and audit mechanism.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The institution ensures gender equity through creation of facilities, conduct of curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. It gives impetus for women to contribute and grow by providing equal opportunities in administrative and academic responsibilities and evidences highest enrolment of girl students. Sessions on gender equity, gender-based activities and programmes are conducted through various committees. Energy consumption is reduced by using LED bulbs, deploying 40 Kw solar cells generating 23% of total power requirement. The institution manages its solid, liquid and e-waste in association with external agencies. Rainwater harvesting and bore-well recharge system facilitates raising ground water level. Single use plastic is avoided on the campus. The campus is maintained green with lawns and trees. Green, energy and environment audits are periodically conducted. State Government of A. P in the year 2019 on 2nd October bestowed Appreciation Plaque in achieving the objectives of Swachha Andhra Mission on the occasion of 150 years of Mahatma Gandhi's Birth Anniversary Celebrations by Hon Chief Minister of Andhra Pradesh, Shri Y.S.Jagan Mohan Reddy at Karapa in Kakinada. Another recognition Memento was bestowed on JKCCollege for Campaigning against the use of Plastic by Hon Collector of Guntur Dist. Ramps/lifts, disabled friendly washrooms, display boards, signposts and scribe facilities are provided to support Divyangjan students. Harmonious ambience is maintained by conducting multicultural festivals and ethnic food carnivals.

However, it being an autonomous college and has liberty to introduce the said programmes, necessary discussions taken place and resolved to introduce some of the courses like, Mathematics, Commerce and Economics (MEC) and 4-year Degree courses (UG & PG) programmes are planned in near future to fulfil the envisioned recommendations of NEP-2020.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

This autonomous institution is on the way of registering the institution at the outset in digi locker followed by registration of students (outgoing) in the concerned Head login of NAD website. Further, the regulatory body APSCHE and affiliating university have not given instructions to the colleges to register in NAD website. However we will be doing it being an autonomous college. As soon as the semester end exams are completed and before starting the penultimate semester academic session, the registration process would be completed and made use of the benefits of NAD duly giving awareness and wide publicity among all students about this important initiative.

3. Skill development:

Emulating, the skill based curriculum, the institution has a revived approach towards running vocational courses which are being offered by 3 Departments of the college. The UGC sponsored undergraduate vocational courses are pivotal in producing skilled graduates in tune with industrial revolution 4.0. The introduced B - Vocational programmes enabled the aspiring youth to find employment opportunities in local areas, and a potential Job-given through the set of vocational, employable and entrepreneurial skill imparted to them at different stages of education and training. The courses are: 1. B.Voc: IT/Ites/Web Technology/Software Development 2. B.Voc: Cehmical and Petrochemicals/Industrial Chemistry. 3 B.Voc: Life Sciences/Industrial Microbiology. The College has been undertaking skill based, short term, value based courses as additional curriculum, to enhance their skill and knowledge for better employment or entrepreneurial activity. Our prime aim is to cultivate "21st Century Skills" among students including critical thinking, creative thinking, problem solving and digital literacy etc., In our College AP state Skill Development Centre started during the year 2017. AP State Govt. provide the

equipment like 43" PHILIPS (LED) TVs:2, iBall Tabs: 30 Nos. WiFi Hotspots: 2 Nos, WiFi Router: 1, Public Address System: 1 and Laptops: 30 Nos. The center has MoU with National Association o Software and Services Companies(NASSCOM) industries that impart employability skills, interval skills and other skills that enhances that students towards higher cognitive levels to achieve the vision of the institution. Thus the institution has been striving to lay the foundations for a sustainable skill development ecosystem to reap the desired out comes from the students of the institution.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

The students of Humanities, at present learning knowledge from ancient India and modern India. Indian knowledge systems include tribal knowledge and indigenous traditional ways of learning covered and included as Vedic mathematics, Yoga & Meditation as co-curricular practices. The following steps will be initiated during BOS meetings of Depts./ Subjects concerned. a) Improving language teaching to be more experiential and to focus on the ability to converse and interact in the language and not just on literature, vocabulary and grammar of the language. b) Introducing music, arts, and crafts related short term courses for selected students in the form of Add on course / certificate courses. c) Research Projects. d) Teaching Sanskrit in interesting and innovative ways and connected to other contemporary and relevant subjects like Maths, Astronomy, Philosophy, Linguistics, Dramatics, Yoga etc. While maintaining autonomy, the faculty and students will be trained as a part of robust and rigorous multidisciplinary programmes.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The college has already done in this direction. Curriculum for all UG and PG programmes for the students admitted in the academic year 2020-21 has been revised in line with NEP-2020 by incorporating modules of Communication Skills, Life Skills, Professional Skills in UG programmes, as foundation courses compulsory for all UG programmes and benchmarking the same with learning outcome based curriculum frame work (LOCF) of UGC. Outcome Based Education (OBE) / Competencies Based Curriculum (CBC) have been framed with CBCS, virtual labs, have been adopted in must of the curriculum leading to online performance of lab experiments during the pandemic period. Evaluation

and Assessment / Examination system has been totally revised for pragmatic assessment incorporating questions from question bank prepared during online midterm Examinations case studies, critical thinking and problem solving related to real time applications, creativity and the Question Papers of end semester examinations are designed inline with Blooms Taxonomy levels. A blue print of Question papers is also designed accordingly in all most all subjects of UG & PG. Industry internships have been made integral part of the curriculum apart from field projects field visits, summary etc. to enhance participative and experiential learning in real life situations and to intensity bond with local and other related communities while doing the project works.

6. Distance education/online education:

It is true that online education and opened and Distance Learning (ODL) after some key changes, can play an important role in enhancement of total GER in Higher Education. Despite of the fact that the affiliating colleges are not permitted to offer either ODL courses or online courses as well as per the guidelines of regulatory bodies of the State Govt. Alternatively JKC College has been under taking / Coordinating the ODL courses of BR Ambedkar Open University on distance mode. The contact hours and practical sessions in case of science courses, are being taken up by the faculty of the college as per the Academic Schedule. Hence except issuing Degree certificate, all other processes from Admission, Academics, Study material distribution, conduct of examinations etc. are being taken up by the college. Further, in case of offering online courses, the regulatory authorities of the state has not permitted the affiliated college including autonomous college due to lack of clarity from higher authorities like State Council of Higher Education etc., However, the institution is ready to take up both ODL courses and online education for which, a well established 'Media Center' for e-content Development and LMS to share the developed content etc. are available in the institution. Awaiting for opportunity through NEP-2020 operational guidelines to take up the ODL courses and online education in near future, by this proactive autonomous college with a hoary past.

Yes. The Electoral Literacy Club (ELC) of Jagarlamudi Kuppuswamy Choudary College was set up in the month of July, 2020

2. Whether students' co-ordinator and co-ordinating faculty members are appointed by the College and whether the ELCs are functional? Whether the ELCs are representative in character?

Dr. D. Rahul, Lecturer in Chemistry and Programme Officer of NSS, is the Co-ordinator and Mr. Mohana Ram is the Co-ordinator from students' community. The other NSS Programme Officers, Mr. L. Ajay Babu assistant co-ordinator and Mr. K. Charan Choudary assistant co-ordinator along with Sri A. Venkata Krishna, Vice-Chairman of Youth Red Cross Wing and Sadvarthana. The ELC has been functional since July, 2020 when it was established. The Electoral Literacy Club works in consonance with the objectives that are aligned with the needs of present electoral practices. These objectives are communicated effectively to all the students and so decision-making process becomes easy and effective. The faculty members of ELC with the active support and involvement of student Co-ordinator chalk out the activities as specified in the minutes. This includes attending meetings, volunteering for events, and contributing to the organization's initiatives, arranging guest lectures, taking out rallies, conducting elocution and essay writing competitions. Information about them is sent through communication channels like notices and college WhatsApp groups in place that allow for easy and regular communication. The organization creates a positive impact on the minds of students as it helps them become good citizens. The ELC reflects the diversity of the communities it serves. This includes diversity in terms of gender, age, religion, language, and other characteristics. Reviewing and assessing its policies, procedures, and practices is also done so as to ensure that the composition of ELC is representative.

3. What innovative programmes and initiatives undertaken by the ELCs? These may include voluntary contribution by the students in electoral processes-participation in voter registration of students and communities where they come from, assisting district election administration in conduct of poll, voter awareness campaigns, promotion of

The E.LC of our college took up many programmes and initiatives that are aligned with the systematic Voters' Education and Electoral Participation program, (SVEEP) which is the flagship programme of the Election Commission. To carry forward its initiatives, a symposium on the Process of Elections and Young Voters' Role wherein students discussed

ethical voting, enhancing participation of the under privileged sections of society especially transgender, commercial sex workers, disabled persons, senior citizens, etc.

many issues relevant to the process of Election, its strength and limitations. Students of ELC volunteer to organize on a wide range of topics pertaining to the problems of elections to promote learning and knowledge sharing among their peers. They are basically student-centred providing an excellent opportunity for students to showcase their abilities in a democratic manner. The ELC has also take part in a series of activities like the mega rally undertaken by the District Medical Health Organization of Guntur to create awareness about electoral system, exercising adult franchise conscientiously keeping in mind the larger interests of society and different underprivileged sections. In fact, the various activities taken up by the ELC are aimed at generating awareness in all stakeholders in general and the less advantaged sections in particular. The surveys conducted in the adopted colonies help the underprivileged sections arrive at better understanding of the process of elections.

4. Any socially relevant projects/initiatives taken by College in electoral related issues especially research projects, surveys, awareness drives, creating content, publications highlighting their contribution to advancing democratic values and participation in electoral processes, etc.

Under the auspices of District Medical Health Organization, Guntur (DMHO) a mega rally was taken out and the ELC of JKC College was in the forefront. Similarly students' survey in the adopted areas, Netaji Nagar and Swarna Bharathi Nagar where underprivileged people live in great number sensitize students understand the issues in the elections. Students published articles in JKC College Magazines in the issue of 2020-2021 titled "In What Way Can Students Better Present Election Scenario?" and another article in the following year titled as "Is Casting Vote a Right or a Responsibility?" in 2022-2023. The article covers comprehensively the electoral system in India, its strengths and shortcomings, ways to strengthen democracy by participating effectively in the electoral process with informed awareness, the dynamic role of students in the process, which entails the smooth functioning of electoral process so that democratic values can be ensured. Thus the initiatives of ELC of our College which are evident in the publications

ELC of JKC College has institutionalised mechanisms to register eligible students as voters. Students are given the opportunity to register to vote. The members of ELC are very sensitive to the programmes of election authorities of Guntur district to get young voters between the age groups of 18-21

registered. As reflected in the minutes, the ELC is keen on partnering with election authorities, civic organizations, and community groups to create a collaborative approach to voter registration. It disseminates information about who is eligible to register, when and how to register, and how the educational institution will help students register. It also furnishes information to students in various ways, including during orientation, through the handbook and the Resource Guide to Colleges which has FAQs. It conducts voter registration drives on campus periodically in collaboration with community partners. The guest lectures and digital aid sessions conducted in the auditorium every year can help students understand the importance of voting and make informed decisions at the ballot box. The ELC makes use of technology available in the college and offers online voter registration services to students to make the democratic process more vibrant. Further the ELC conducts campus-wide campaigns and takes out rallies to generate awareness about voter registration, including promoting registration deadlines and providing information on how to register.



1.3.1 Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics ,Gender, Human Values ,Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Response:

According to NEP 2020, the quality higher education must aim to develop good, thoughtful, well rounded and creative individuals.

The motto of the institution is "Shelena Shobhate Vidya" meaning "Character brings luster to education". The institution also focuses on character building of student along with regular learning process.

JKCC has included the cross-cutting issues relevant to Gender equality, Environmental, Conservation, sustainable development, Human values and Professional ethics in the curriculum followed under CBCS pattern of Outcome Based Education.

Human values and Professional Ethics:

A mandatory course, "Human values and professional Ethics" is offered to all UG students to create an awareness on values and ethics. All the programmes integrate courses that teach 'Human values and Professional Ethics' in its curricula as a Life Skill Course.

- Core courses like Business Communication, Human Resource Management, Organizational Behavior, Industrial relations and Business Ethics & Corporate Governance are offered in BBA Programme.
- Business Laws, Accounting for service organization, Research Methodology, Brand Management, Marketing and Business Environment are included as core courses in the curriculum of B.Com.
- All courses offered by Department of English and Department of Oriental Languages are aimed at imparting human values through literature.
- Two months community service project with 4 credits is made mandatory course to all UG students to mould the students into socially responsible citizens.

Gender: The mandatory courses offered in language stream, English, Telugu, Hindi and Sanskrit focus on Gender issues and Gender equality. Anti-Sexual Harassment Cell organizes many programmes related to

Gender equality.

The issues related to Gender equality are included in the curriculum of MA English Programme.

Environment and Sustainability:

The compulsory Life skill course "Environmental Studies" sensitizes the students to the preservation and sustenance of the Eco system on earth. It is offered to all the UG students. The issues like Climate change, deforestation, Global warming, pollution and rapid industrialization are discussed in this course.

Skill development courses like Plant Nursery, Fruits & Vegetable Preservation, Dairy Techniques, Food Adultration and Solar energy are offered as choice-based courses.

Plant diversity and Human welfare, Ethnobotany and Medicinal Botany, Principles of Aqua Culture, Bio Process Technology, Animal Bio Technology, Green Chemistry, Plant Ecology and Phytogeography etc., Courses are incorporated in the curriculum of B.Sc. Programmes. The curriculum of MSc Microbiology and MSc Biotechnology also deals with the issues of Environment.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

The students taking admission in the institution are from diversified socio-economic conditions of the society, more particularly from rural areas. It becomes necessary to the institution in taking care of students with different learning levels. The institution has developed a mechanism through which the different levels of students are assessed and addressed.

The Student Induction Programme is conducted for newly admitted students as per UGC guidelines. This helps the students from different sections of society to adjust with college environment. The learning levels of students are assessed from performance in the first MID Test and from feedback of course teachers based on classroom discussions. The Mentor Mentee system is also used for this assessment. Based on all these considerations, slow and advanced learners are identified. The institution is committed to its vision and mission and strives to deliver quality education for students of different learning levels.

Bridge Courses: Bridge Courses of minimum one week duration is conducted by the departments to fill the learning gap among students. The department of English conducts bridge courses before commencement of every academic year.

Slow Learners: The slow learners are encouraged to participate in all class activities. They are provided with academic support in terms of suitable teaching learning methods. Mentors provide moral and psychological support to slow learners.

The special programmes and supports given to slow learners include

- Conduct of Remedial classes
- Teaching Bilingually
- Assignments
- Providing simplified study material
- Providing question banks for courses taught
- Supervising group work and peer teaching
- Special lectures and motivational sessions by experts
- Monitoring progress periodically.

Advanced Learners: Advanced learners are encouraged to play an active role in academic and administrative activities of the institution. They are encouraged to reach greater heights through the

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following measures.

- Encouraging them to take part in workshops, seminars, internships, inter collegiate competitions etc.
- Encouraging them to present research papers or posters in National and International seminars or workshops.
- Entrusting the activity Tutoring peer students with learning difficulty.
- Encouraging to register for online NPTEL/MOOCS Courses to get extra credits.
- Encouraging to participate in book review competitions conducted by the department of Library Science
- Encouraging to register for value added courses offered by the departments.
- Encouraging to take part in "Earn while Learn programme" in the college.
- Conducting career awareness programmes to motivate them to pursue higher education.

The college is conducting programmes like "Market Makers", IT VEDA, Leadership Training Programme with the help of M R Pai foundation to exposé them to exhibit their creating and critical thinking skills. The identified advanced learners are made as class representatives to take care of academic activities of the class.

The soft skill training provided to them before campus placement drives yielded good results and many outgoing students got placements.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

Response: To cater the needs of students with different learning abilities, our college follow different teaching methodologies. The teaching learning process of the institution is made student centric by

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providing a inductive learning environment. In this process, the teaching creates a positive ambience in the classroom so that both slow and advanced learners can involve actively in the learning process.

The Choice-Based Credit Systems with Outcome Based Education model followed by the institution can impart adequate skills and positive attitude in the student centric learning.

Experiential Learning: Experiential Learning is the process of learning by doing. Many of the skill-based courses offered by the institution provide hands on experience to students to enhance their skills. The curricular and co-curricular activities that impart grater learning opportunities through experiential learning are integrated in the learning process.

- Practical learning exposure is given to students by hands-on laboratory experiments in all science stream courses.
- Internship is incorporated in the curriculum of revised CBSC pattern for all students from the academic year 2020-21 .
- Student projects in many courses provide the skill-based learning.
- **Market Makers**, an event organized annually by the Department of Commerce provide platform to understand event planning, product promotion and business skills.
- Entrepreneurship Development Programmes, exhibitions organized for commerce and management students provide learning business skills.
- Computer Assisted Language Lab (CALL) is used to enhance the communicational skills.
- The Course Project for PG students enhances their skills to understand the working modes of industries.
- The active participation of students in the activities of committees and clubs of the institution develop new competencies in adjusting with work environment.

Participative Learning: Participative Learning methods are used to encourage students to get involved in their learning process actively. The participative learning techniques implemented in the institution include

- Seminars with power point presentations.
- Educational tours.
- Soft skill training workshops organized by Training and Placement Cell.
- Expert lecturers and workshops.
- Book review competitions by college library.
- Quiz and other competitions by departments.
- Field trips by departments of biological sciences.
- Need based industrial visits.
- Herbal Plants Exhibition by Department of Botany.
- Workshops organized by extension activities wing for providing hands-on training to students.
- Programmes organized by Eco Club, Entrepreneurship development cell, Youth Red Cross wing in imparting awareness on consumer rights, health and hygiene and many social issues.
- Poster presentation competitions.

Problem Solving Methods: Problem solving is carried out by involving the students in

- CRT Training Classes
- Writing Programmes in Computer Programming Languages
- Soft Skill Programmes

- Creation of small models using software by Electronics students.
- Developing software for solving real life problems by computer science students.

Conventional Lecture methods are complemented by introducing internships and project work for UG and PG students of some departments as a part of implementation of CBSC in 2015-2016. Internships and project work are made mandatory to all the students of UG programmes from 2020-2021 under revised CBSC pattern.

Teachers use ICT enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning processes.

- The curriculum delivery of the institution is transformed from conventional method to Blended Learning Method using ICT tools available on the campus.
- Teachers use ICT tools for effective teaching and also for giving students more flexibility to customize their learning experiences.
- The institution has provided ICT facilities like LCD Projectors, Desktops and Laptops, Photo Copier Machines, Printer, Digital Classrooms, Virtual Classrooms, Smart Boards, Wi-Fi facility, Digital Library facilities and online platforms for teaching like Zoom, Google Meet.
- Computer Assisted Language Lab (CALL) is established for effective learning of communicative English.

Use of ICT by Faculty:

- **Blended learning**: Online courses from NPTEL, SWAYAM, MOOCS from ANU are included in the curriculum under revised CBCS pattern of OBE model.
- **Remote Library usage**: The Library is subscribed to e-journals, e-books available under The NLIST programme of the INFLIBNET center. Students can access them.
- The e- repository of the college library contains content developed by faculty such as study material, question banks, previous question papers, video lectures and PPTS. All these are accessible to students.
- Teachers use mobile apps WhatsApp and Telegram to share course materials, assignments and information related to their communication skills and careers with students.
- IT facilities: All the laboratories of the Department of Computer Science are maintained with systems updated to the latest hardware configurations. All the systems are connected to the LAN.
- All departments have access to LCDs for effective delivery of lectures and other teaching-related activities.

- The skill development center of the college has Laptops, students utilize them for training on employable skills (CRT).
- The institution has virtual classroom developed under RUSA 2.0 grants. It is used to conduct webinars and workshops to make the learning process of students as participative and experiential learning.
- Online Quiz: Faculty conduct online Quizzes using Google forms.
- Video Lectures: Video lectures prepared by the faculty are made available on the college website.
- Faculty took online classes through Zoom and the recordings of classes are made available to students during COVID 19 lockdown period. This is the quality initiative of IQAC.
- Faculty use Digital classrooms and classrooms with smart boards to present their PPTS and to conduct poster presentation sessions and seminars by students.
- Seminar halls equipped with digital facilities are effectively used for conducting seminars, workshops, and competitions for students in online mode.
- Every department is provided with two desktops along with printer facility and network. They are used in preparing syllabus and questionnaire for Quizzes, assignments and course content which are in turn provided to students.
- The college is connected through high-speed internet. The optimum usage of ICT facilities is governed by SOP of IT Policy. The college periodically conducts workshops for staff to acquaint themselves with software.
- Online Faculty Development Programmes were organized for Faculty through virtual classrooms.
- Students complete Online Internships and online training sessions using ICT facilities of the college.
- The college website is made as a source of necessary information required to the students.

- The Head of the Department, in consultation with faculty, finalizes the allotment of courses, timetable and other responsibilities before commencement of class work.
- The curriculum approved in the BOS of the department is taught according to allotted hours using student centric teaching-learning methods to attain the outcome of the course.
- Department Meetings are conducted regularly to review the implementation of academic plans.
- Every faculty member prepares Teaching Plan for allotted course before the commencement of class work. It consists of Course Outcomes, topics to be taught, hours allotted for teaching,

pedagogy, student centric curricular and co-curricular activities for effective teaching. Every teacher maintains a teaching dairy which consists of day wise and hour wise activities of teaching.

- The Head of the Department monitors teaching dairy every week.
- At the end of each semester Principal reviews the teaching plans and dairies of all the faculty.
- All these academic records are preserved and submitted to external and internal audits conducted by IQAC.

The IQAC of the institution prepares the Action Plan for different Co-Curricular and Extracurricular activities to be done in the present academic year in consultation with Departments and wings. The IQAC monitors the effective implementation of the plan and also records the activities done.


College follows the CBCS Pattern under OBE as suggested by UGC and APSCHE. The Curriculum Framework includes Life Skill Courses, Skill Development Courses, Skill Enhancement Courses as core courses and internship for one semester.

The evaluation process consists of two parts with 40:60 weightage from 2020-21.

• Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA)

- Semester End Examination (SEE)
- The revised pattern of CIA includes 2 Mid Tests, Assignment, Quiz, Seminar and Attendance with due weightage.
- The Academic performance of students is given in terms of grade points, SGPA and CGPA.
- Students must earn required credits by participating in Yoga, NCC, NSS, Community service and Internship.
- The institution has a well-established office of the Controller of Examinations. The planning and execution of the examination and assessment process is done systematically by maintaining confidentiality at every stage.
- The examination procedures and processes of the institution are transparent, well defined and made available to stake holders through the college calendar and website.

IT Integration in The Examination Process:



- : The Examination Management System of the institution is integrated with IT. The following are the key features.
 - Nominal Roll generation and mapping of their courses.
 - Generation of Examination application forms and collection.
 - Generation of hall tickets with details of courses and dates of examinations.
 - Compilation of Examination timetable and seating arrangement.
 - Downloadable application for Revaluation, Duplicate marks statement and transcript.
 - The coding and decoding of answer scripts is done using integrated software.
 - Error-less and high-speed printing of question papers is achieved using systems and digital printers.
 - Conversion of marks entered for each course into grade points and letter grades.
 - Examination results are made available in the college website so that a student can view and download his result only.
 - Issue of Grade cards at the end of each semester with SGPA.
 - Issue of Consolidated Marks Memo, Provisional Certificate at the end of the Programme.
 - Submission of soft copy of Tabulated Register of students to university for issue of original degree.
 - CC TV Cameras are installed in all the strategic places in the examination section.

- The tracking of student history in terms of academic progress is made possible using software.
- The Software of the COE Office has been customized to automate the examination procedures of the college.

Examination Reforms:

- The evaluation process related to CIA is being revised by increasing the weightage from 25:75 to 40:60 (CIA: SEE). New evaluation Pedagogies like quizzes, surprise tests, seminars are included in CIA.
- The revised CBCS pattern with 6 months' internship and two short term projects were introduced for all UG programmes from 2020-2021.
- The implementation of outcome Based Education leads to incorporation of PO's COs with appropriate assessment tools, which is reflected in the CIA and SEE question papers.
- With the IT integration in Examination procedures, elaborate result analysis of student's performance is made possible. This is given as feedback for continuous improvement in the curriculum design, teaching and evaluation methods.

3.6 Extension Activities

The NSS units of the institution as a part of the extension component of education serves the neighbouring communities with student volunteers guided by our three teacher programme officers.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

The college is set on 6.802 acres of lush green campus with infrastructure and buildings having all required amenities.

The college has 55 Classrooms, 30 Laboratories, 4 Seminar halls, e- class rooms, Audio-visual halls, Virtual class rooms, Staff rooms, Individual rooms for different cells, Auditorium, English language labs, UG & PG Libraries and individual department libraries, rest room for women staff and students and canteen. The college provides lift and ramp facility for differently abled students. The College has a library stacked with necessary books related to academic syllabus as well as reference books, Study material, Journals, Newspapers and Magazines and e-Library facilities. The college has 2 RO plants for pure drinking water facility. In addition to the above facilities the College is provided with three un-interrupted power supply Generators of 100K.V.A, 20K.V.A and 10 K.V.A and has solar system (natural resource) of 20 KW, Union Bank of India, and First-Aid room in the Health Centre. The college has a Distance Education Block, Parking sheds and Vermicomposting.

1. Classroom facilities

- 1. There are 55 well- ventilated and spacious classrooms with furniture to accommodate the students.
- 2. Accessibility to main floors is provided through elevators, broad staircases and corridors.
- 3.30 classrooms are equipped with LCD projectors. 30 Laptops are available for students and staff.

- 5. Wi-Fi access points in all the floors of all the buildings enable connectivity during classes.

The institution is well-equipped to coach students in both indoor and outdoor sports activities, as well as hosting tournaments and cultural events.

Sports Facilities:

For athletic sporting activities and games, the college has a 4.0-acres playground, which includes outdoor facilities for cricket, athletics and other track and field events, separate volleyball and basketball courts. The college is provided with Indoor games such as table tennis, carom, chess, and shuttle badminton in an area of nearly 4833 Sq. ft. The College has active student teams for different Sports that participate on a continual basis in various Intercollegiate and State level matches.

Physical education department provides morning diet for the participants of various games. Every day students use the indoor and outdoor games facilities for practice before and after college hours. The college organizes competitions in Sports and games on various occasions, and the College Sports Day Celebrations. The winners are duly awarded with Certificates and

A Gymnasium in an area of nearly 2100 Sq. ft. for students and staff has modern equipment such as weight lifting set, , dumbbells, chest expander, arm curler, Thread miller, cross trainer, Bench Press, Leg Press, steam bath etc.

Fine Arts & Cultural Activities:

Cultural activities have a vital role in students' overall development. During the college annual day, students participate in a variety of cultural events. They are also guided by faculty and professionals from respective fields to compete in other college competitions.

They present their skills on all occasions of the college like Independence Day, National Level Seminars, Workshops, Alumni Meets, Cultural Festivals, and College Anniversary etc. The College has an auditorium to plan and practice for cultural events.

Champions in Intercollegiate youth festival participated at South Indian Universities.

YOGA classes were arranged for the students by yoga teacher. International Yoga day was celebrated every year. Yoga is made mandatory course for all UG students in revised CBCS 2020-21.

Jagarlamudi Kuppuswamy Choudary College library is fully automated with Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) supported by 'SOUL2.0' Software, designed and developed by INFLIBNET

center, Ahmedabad based on the needs of the college. Barcode system is used in all types of transactions. PG library is also fully automated with ILMS Oracle Software.

The college has two full fledged libraries UG Library (5810.89 sq.ft) and PG Library (1800 sq. ft). UG library is equipped with over 57,365 books (45125 titles), 2249 Bound periodicals, 1004 CD/DVDs, 48 Journals & Magazines, 05 Newspapers, 372 Maps and 425 Microfiches. PG Library is equipped with over 15,643 books (5518 titles), 783 Bound periodicals, 29 Journals & Magazines, 979 CD/DVDs and 138 Project reports. An average amount of Rs.14 lakhs have been spent for the purchase of books, e-books, subscription to journals / e-journals during the accreditation period.

Different sections of the library includes Circulation section, Reading room, Reference section, Bound periodical section, E-learning center, Reprography, SC & ST Book bank section and Stack area section. The Library advisory committee guides the students in all respects under the Chairmanship of the Principal as Chairman of the committee.

1.Digital Databases and ICT Services:

The information retrieval systems in libraries enable the exchange of information through interoperability and sustainability, and the following are the key features:

- Remote access facility for e-Resources of N-LIST (e-Shodh Sindu), DELNET and WEB OPAC.
- E-Learning Center and Internet center are available with 16 computers (both UG & PG libraries) for accessing e- resources and Internet facilty.1Gbps internet speed is available in the campus.
- Provision of access to old question papers, newspaper clippings, open access free online e=resources & college archives through JKC College library web portal.
- The library provides free open e-resources through "JKC College library Telegram group" to the faculty and students.
- 32 rare and valuable books are digitized with help of Manasu foundation, Bangalore.

2. User-friendly, Spatial and Reprographic Facilities

- Jagarlamudi Kuppuswamy Choudary College UG & PG libraries provide open access to reading materials, computer services, and the internet.
- UG & PG libraries are equipped with separate spacious reading halls. UG Library is equipped with a seating capacity of more than 200 persons.
- Reprographic facility is available in the library on payment of nominal charge.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

The institution is positive in providing state of the art IT infrastructure with periodic assessment of efficiency of existing facility. The institution also provides the facility of printing, scanning and photo copy to all the students and faculties. The library of the institution is also well equipped and has a Wi-Fi and internet facility. Individual login ID is provided to every student to access e-library, e-books, e-journals through N-list.

IT Policy of the college ensures optimal maintenance and utilization of IT infrastructure for the benefit of students. It looks after the purchase and upgradation of Systems and software, maintenance of equipment and disposal of e-waste.

The college is using licensed and open licensed software for different academic requirement of the students.

The organization follows the software policy provided by the developers and usage instructions are also provided in the policy for different stakeholders.

There is an organizational system for the monitoring and maintenance of infrastructure and maintenance of the institution.

Laboratory:

Labs are maintained by lab assistants. The stocks and records of all laboratories are maintained by store keepers and record assistants under the supervision of department HoDs. Department wise annual stock verification is done by committees constituted for the purpose. Some of the laboratories have excess number of lab setups when compared to the requirement and if there is any set up failure the students do not suffer.

Library:

The Library Committee monitors the developments of the library, and meets annually to suggest new initiatives and purchases. Staff and students record their recommendations and suggestions for the availability of books and Journals, based on which action is taken. Enough provision is made by the college for purchase of new books and also for subscribing to new journals.

Sports:

The College provides several indoor and outdoor sports facilities. The College has a well-equipped Sports Complex comprising Fitness Centre, Shuttle Court and Basketball court. These facilities are open to the staff and students.

Computers and IT infrastructure:

Best Practice - 1

Title of the Practice: **Green Campus**

OBJECTIVES OF THE PRACTICE:

- To inculcate Environmental awareness in students
- To make Environmental consciousness as part the daily life
- To bring a change in attitude towards environmental protection
- To make the campus green and litter free and plastic free
- Effective use of waste management

Context:. For the past few decades the world has realised the importance of environmental protection and

we are witnessing a paradigm shift in almost all discourses towards a better, less polluted, green environment as the pressing need of the hour. Environmental deterioration has reached such an alarming proportion that the only solution is a fundamental shift in attitude. This is where the role of students as the future citizens and the ambassadors of change come in handy. Our college wanted to tap this potential of students and create in them heightened awareness for environmental protection.

Practice: A green protocol is implemented in the campus and Green protocol statement is fixed in relevant places. Single use plastic is banned in the campus and steel vessels, glasses, leaf-plates etc are used. Use of plastic water bottles is not completely banned but reduced to the maximum extent. Effective waste management system is also implemented by collecting solid waste, bio waste and electronic waste separately. Green lawns, Trees, Plants in pots and plants around the college are maintained for eco balance. Green vegetables and Tomatoes are grown in containers and distributed to staff. We also give Tulasi Plants to Guests that come to various events on our college campus. Rain water from the terrace is channelized into rain water harvesting pits and old big well. Our Cricket field has turf pitch and also the excess rain water is channelized to drain and then into rain water harvesting pit.

Evidence Of Success: Campus has become cleaner and litter free . There is heightened awareness in students, which is evident in their participation in a number of extension activities related to environment like Tree Plantation, Cleaning activities under NSS, activities under Eco and Swatch activities etc. Our Green and clean practices are recognized by our State Government on 2nd October,2019, and bestowed Appreciation Plaque in achieving the objectives of Swatcha Andhra Mission on the occasion of 150 years of Mahatma Gandhi's Birth Anniversary Celebrations. Hon Chief Minister of Andhra Pradesh, Shri YS. Jagan Mohan Reddy at Karapa in Kakinada. Another recognition Memento was bestowed on JKCCollege for Campaigning against the use of Plastic by Hon District Collector, Guntur.

Problems Encountered And Resources Required: Additional cost needed for the implementation of green protocol caused initial problems. Though everyone is aware of the environmental crisis most of them consider it as a distant phenomenon. So implementation of the programme was little bit difficult in the beginning but awareness classes, posters, rallies and activities were conducted through Eco Club to create more awareness among student community.

BEST PRACTICE-2

Title of the practice: Training and Placements for students.

1. Objectives of the practice:

Training and Placements for final year students:

Most of our students who get admitted into our College come from rural back grounds. They come from either agricultural family or from below the poverty line. So, we aim not only to give best education but also see them settled before their completion of graduation in our College. So that they can stand on their own legs and also support their parents. We have tailored different training programmes to suit for different job demands. Students belonging to different courses like BSc, B.Com, BCA and BBA are trained according to the demands of various placements companies .

3. The Context:

1. Training and Placements: To motivate the students to join the Special Job Training Programme is a Herculean task. Most of the students concentrate on their studies rather than getting the Job. To design and prepare material that suit to all kinds of Job Melas and examinations is really a challenging Job.

4. Practice:

1. Training and Placements:

To start the special training Programme beyond the college hours is a challenging task. Most of our students come from neighbouring villages. Either to come early or to stay back is a problem for them. To get resource persons to teach in these odd hours is another problem. Since ours is an Autonomous institution, we have to assess the students continually, very little time is left to train them for job opportunities. As our students come from rural back ground they have poor communication skills. And they also lack the courage, manners and etiquette to talk in public. As there are too many areas to be improved, the students shrink back and get them complete the training programme is a herculean task. To improve language skills the Dept. of English prepared CDs on Phonetic Skills focusing on Sounds, Words and Small Dialogues in Situations. They also made CDs collecting Songs that improve the language skills. They made one Voice CD narrating Stories from Hitopadesa, Panchatantra and Jataka Tales trough which students can not only learn language but also human values which are very essential these days. A special CD was made on Figures of speech which will make our students talk better, and express their feelings well in job interviews and Debating Competitions. In order to make them expose to world's Best Speeches the Dept. of English prepared World Famous Orations Booklet and Voice CD so that our students will excel in speeches and Orations.

Our YRC JKC Wing has received numerous awards for their outstanding services, including recognition from the DHATRI Foundation for their excellent work and from the Indian Association for the Blind for the exceptional services our volunteers offer.

At our college, we understand the importance of preserving our environment. Our lush green lawns, trees, plants, shrubs, and herbal plants on the campus and in the neighborhood help us breathe fresh air. The founders of our institution have lovingly cared for our trees, some of which have been standing for over 50 years. Our green and clean practices have been recognized by the state government, which bestowed an appreciation plaque upon us in 2019 for achieving the objectives of Swatch Andhra Mission on the occasion of 150 years of Mahatma Gandhi's birth anniversary celebrations by our Honourable Chief Minister of Andhra Pradesh, Shri YS. Jagan Mohan Reddy, at Karapa, in Kakinada. We also received another recognition memento for campaigning against the use of plastic from the Honorable Collector of Guntur Dist.

Our college is dedicated to provide proactive students with the necessary skills and abilities through various active cells. Our mission is to promote education and skill development initiatives for the underprivileged community in and around Guntur. The training and placement cell of our college plays a crucial role in identifying job opportunities for undergraduate and postgraduates passing out from the college by keeping in touch with reputed firms and industrial establishments. The cell is to guide students to choose right career and to give knowledge, skill, and aptitude and meet the manpower requirements of the industry/company. The cell is maintaining and updating regularly the data base of the students. It is also maintaining the database of companies and establishing strategic links for campus recruitments. The placement cell operates round the year to facilitate contacts between companies and graduates.

The main motto of placement cell includes

- Increase the employability
- Improves skills and knowledge according to the challenges of global markets,
- Accelerate personal growth
- Grow with professional network
- Provides skill based training

We have set up a Skill Development Centre that offers placement opportunities to unemployed youth and students of other colleges. We have a MoU with the Andhra Pradesh State Skill Development Corporation (APSSDC), which regularly conducts various skill development programs (online and offline) in collaboration with us. We offer tailor-made programs in collaboration with APITA for soft skills, communication skills, entrepreneurship skills, and personality development programs. Our Department of English also organizes value-added courses on soft skills. Our Skill Development Center is equipped with the necessary IT infrastructure like laptops, tabs, printers, and display monitors, which are intended for student training programs for UG and PG students.

Our management members respond readily to the needs of the students and staff and provide necessary infrastructure such as e-classrooms, lifts, turf pitch cricket grounds, basketball courts, multi-gym, and shuttle courts. Our library has over 73,008 books with 50643 titles, 77 journals and magazines, including rare books. We have equipped our library with the latest information technologies, including web-based information, e-books and e-journals search, OPAC, and internet browsing. The library is linked with the NLIST consortium for online books and journals, and it maintains over one lakh collections of books, reference books, theses, monographs, back volumes, journals, audio-visuals, and e-resources. Our college Library have been recognised with Best Library award from our parent University.

The institution encourages research culture and instils scientific temperament. Our Institution has

- 8 Ph.D. Guides
- 32 scholars were registered for Ph.D.
- 13 Scholars were awarded Ph.D.
- 113 research articles were in Scopus/Web of Science/UGC Care Journals
- 54 Research articles were published with ISSN/ISBN number

Our science labs and language labs are developed to meet modern-day needs and have been recognized with the Best Laboratory Awards from our parent university. Our computer labs are well-maintained and upgraded regularly to provide the students with the necessary programs and languages. The Department of English has designed and developed many language skills and communication skills resources that have helped the students improve their communication skills.

Our institution adopted CBCS in 2015-16 and it is revised in 2020-21 by considering UGC guidelines on outcome Based Education and NEP 2020. Two months community service project, two-months short-term internship and Six-months internship are incorporated in the curriculum of all UG programmes as mandatory courses. Skill Enhancement Courses and Life Skill Courses are introduced for UG programs to train the students in tuning with current trends in job market. The Teaching and Learning methods followed in the institution are also transformed into student centric. The Evaluation methods are also revised according to the guidelines of UGC and APSCHE.

The institution has provided Wi-Fi internet access to faculties and students to avail internet connection at any place within the College. The institution also provides the facility of printing, scanning and photo copy to all the students and faculties. We believe that our dedicated and qualified staff members, supported by an enthusiastic student community, will undoubtedly benefit and upgrade the ultimate stakeholders of the college to make their future brighter and more colourful.

- Research and Consultancy wing was established. 114 research papers were published in UGC referred journals with good impact factor. 55 papers were published with ISSN numbers. 13 of our faculty members got Ph,D., 02 faculty members got M.Phil during this accreditation period.
- 30 class rooms were equipped with ICT tools for better teaching and learning. These ICT tools helped our students not only in exposing to global experts and their lectures on various topics but also improve their language skills and make them a better students fit to get a job in MNC's.

Three Phonetic CD's were compiled from online resources to make our students come out of their mother tongue influence. A voice CD was made exclusively on role play which helped the students to face the interviews without inhibitions
- Both east and west blocks were provided with elevators, ramps and washrooms for Divayangans.
- A modern canteen with hygiene cooking system was constructed where there is a separate section for boys and girls.
- Separate labs for Business lab and Language lab were developed with 40 systems each lab.
- Career counseling along with placement cell and skill development cell planned and executed many training programmes which made our students got placements in MNC's
- Exhibition on carrier oppurtunities is planned regularly by carrier guidance and counseling cell. General knowledge and Quantitative aptitude and logical reasoning are posted in student Whatsapp groups. Achievers in various segments are invited by the carrier guidance cell to motivate students. Placement cell invites corporate companies to conduct campus interviews
